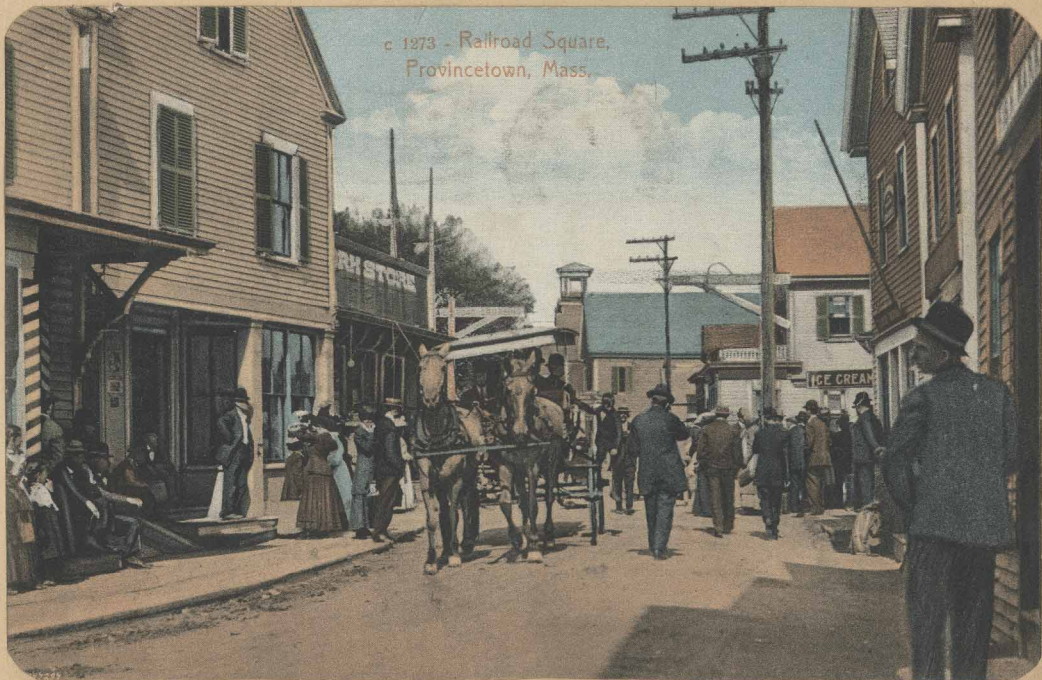
Decoration Day, May 1918. Railroad Square in the background. Pilgrim Theater on right. Arrow: Corabel Mayo, my second cousin.

Old Theatre Is Coming Down

Workmen Now Engaged In Razing Structure

At long last the old theatre building which has been more or less standing in the central section of Provincetown is to be torn down and two workmen are now engaged on the job of dismantling the structure which has long been considered

a fire hazard and an eyesore. Early last week Victor Lewis, owner of the property, said he was undecided just what would be done with the building, whether it would be torn down in part or in whole, or what would take its place if the building were entirely recovered. He could not be reached today to ascertain his final plans. The theatre was at one time the finest on this part of the Cape. Owned by Frank Atkins, it was known as the Atkins Theatre. When Mr. Lewis bought it the name was changed to Pilgrim Theatre.
