Oyster Shells
The people living on Lothrop's hill section of Vine Street are going to petition the town to have a cargo of Florida water dumped on the oyster shells that have lately been placed there. It does not require morbidly sensitive olfactories to discover that there is something there that smells pretty loud. When the shells are broken up, however, there will be a more durable road than ever before.

## November 12, 1873

Capt. Edward Weeks, in sch. Tidal Wave, last Tuesday while coming into the harbor discovered a man clinging to a boat's bottom. He immediately proceeded to the man's rescue reaching him just in time to save him from drowning. He proved to be a Portuguese whose dory, which carried a sail, had capsized during the strong breeze.
