



Bowdoin is the only schooner in America especially designed and built for Arctic work. Because of her 300,000 miles of Arctice voyaging during 26 expeditions and of her narrow escapes from complete destruction, she is one of the most famous schooners in the world today.

She is 88 feet long, 21 feet wide and was built in 1921 in East Boothbay, Maine, by Hodgdon Brothers. A two-masted auxiliary schooner, double-planked and double framed with native white
