88 Bradford Street is a 1-story, 2-bay sidehall cottage. The primary entry is reached by concrete and brick steps and landing. The door has multipane sidelights and an elaborate pedimented hood, with dentils and a unique appliqué. The detail is repeated on the window surrounds on the primary façade. A storm door is present. Windows are paired 2/1 wood DHS with storm windows. There is a band of diamond-shaped shingles across the gable end below the window. There is a large shed dormer located on the west side roof slope. Windows on this façade are grouped 2/1 DHS with storms. There is a 2nd entry here with concrete stoop. This façade has 2 diamond-shaped windows in the dormer and on the 1st floor. Walls contain bands of staggered shingles. Basement level windows on front façade are 2/1 DHS. The right side façade contains paired and single 2/1 DHS and 6/6 DHS windows. Central secondary entry at grade (basement) level. A window is located in an enclosed former entry. Windows have wood trim. Stuccoed chimney on side roof slope.
