165 Bradford Street is a 1 1/2-story, 5-bay, Italianate-style dwelling; the side gable roof is clad in asphalt shingles, with partial cornice returns and two brick chimneys are located in the interior slopes.; the primary façade is clad in clapboard siding and wood shingles clad the secondary facades; the fenestration includes 2/2 wood DHS windows with inoperable shutters; The primary entrance has a wood pane and panel door with a flat hood supported by embellished brackets; A 1-story open porch extends from the side façade, with a shed roof supported by square posts; The west side porch has a shed roof with square wood posts, modern brackets and a historic wood pane and panel door like the main entrance.
