



## Miss Freeman Dies at 96

## Taught 46 Years At Provincetown

Miss Freeman, who was born in San Francisco, Cal., but who came to Provincetown at the age of 9, had lived the last 10 years with Mrs. John Callahan at 26

Orchard Ridge Road, Chappaqua. The retired teacher was a daughter of the late Calvin and Elizabeth (Moore) Freeman, leaving her teaching duties here in 1934, after serving since 1888, reported to be the longest teaching
