the Board of Directors of the Albany Civic Theatre and is a Co-Founder of St. Florian's Theatre in Albany. This summer Kristen stage-managed the PTC productions of *Cute Boys...* and *Something Cloudy, Something Clear.*

Kevin Shenk (Jennie). Kevin is a past president of the PTC Board of Directors. Over the past twelve years, Kevin has appeared in PTC, W.H.A.T. and Harwich productions. PTC performances include *Noises Off; Larry, Queen of Scots; La Ronde; A Thurber Carnival; Night of the Iguana;* and *Fifth of July.* Favorite PTC directors Kevin has worked with include Michael Prevulsky and Max Reagan. For her role in the Chatham Drama Guild production of *Noises Off,* Kevin received an A.C.T.E. award as Best Actress of the Cape season.

Michael Soldier (Richard Knowles) is proud to be a Provincetown-based actor. Michael moved here from New York City last year. He has been seen this year in Ryan Landry's *Medea*, and PTC's productions of *Cute Boys...*, Tennessee Williams' *Something Cloudy, Something Clear*, Edward Albee's *Seascape*, and *Harry Kemp: Poet of the Dunes*. Michael is also the resident massage therapist at the West End Salon, a writer, drag queen and artist.

Thatcher Stevens (Ted Stanhope) appeared locally in three plays this summer: Cute Boys..., with the PTC; and Misconceptions and Bed and Breakfast, both with Beekman Place Productions. He also appeared recently in the PTC presentation of Harry Kemp. Thatcher has performed in numerous productions in Boston, Los Angeles, and Omaha (his hometown). Some of his favorite stage roles include Rudy in Bent, Tommy in The Normal Heart, Antonio in Twelfth Night, and Fauna in Sleeping Beauty, or Coma. Look for Thatcher in the upcoming feature film, "All the Rage."

Guy Strauss (Lewis Hale/John Stanhope) is a member of Actors' Equity Association, SAG and AFTRA. He has just founded the Truro Lower Cape Theatre, whose next events will be Pulitzer Prize-winning poet Alan Dugan on Saturday, November 29; and a one-person play, An Almost Holy Picture, by Heather McDonald, read by Strauss, on Saturday, December 27. Both events will take place at the Winery, Route 6A in North Truro at 8:00pm. This summer Guy appeared in the W.H.A.T. production of David Mamet's A Life in the Theater and PTC's The Judgment of Father Marthinho; he also directed the staged reading of Derek Walcott's play, The Ghost Dance, at Castle Hill Center for the Arts in Truro.

Vanessa Vartabedian (Ann Leslie) appeared in the PTC productions of *Not Smart* as part of the Provincetown O'Neill Anniversary celebration; *Something Cloudy, Something Clear,* playing the roles of Hazel, Celeste Fiddler, and Tallulah Bankhead; and *Harry Kemp: Poet of the Dunes* at the Provincetown Library. Other recent performances include *A Girl's Guide to Chaos* Off-Broadway in New York City; *Durang, Durang* at W.H.A.T.; and *Laughter on the 23rd Floor* at the Orleans Academy of Performing Arts.

Susan Glaspell (1876-1948) was a prolific playwright and novelist. Along with her husband, George Cram "Jig" Cook, she helped found the Provincetown Players. Her one-act satire of Freudian analysis, Suppressed Desires, was part of the initial bill of the Players in 1915. The following year, Trifles was presented by the Players on Mary Heaton Vorse's wharf in the East End of town. Glaspell published nine novels, including "Brooke Evans" (1928), "Ambrose Holt and Family" (1931), "Norma Ashe" (1942), and "Judd Rankin's Daughter." A collection of her short stories, "Lifted Masks," was published in 1912. "A Jury of Her Peers," the 1917 short-story version of Trifles, remains her most popular narrative and was produced for PBS American Playhouse in the 1980s. Glaspell's house still stands in the East End of town, and there is a memorial grave marker in the cemetery of the Truro Congregational Church. Her contribution to American literature is unquestionable and her status in the canon of 20th century American arts and letters is long overdue for a re-evaluation.

John Andert (Eben Stanhope). John is an artist and actor who has made Provincetown his home since 1986. Some of John's favorite roles include Tilden in Sam Shepard's Buried Child (University of Kansas), Benjamin in Sinan Unel's Lost Gospels of Blankenburg (PTC), and both Leo and Sonya Tolstoy in Mr. Unel's Madperson's Chronicle of a Miserable Marriage (PTC, Outermost Performance Group). He is the recipient of two A.C.T.E. awards for his work with PTC. As an artist, John's fine art and cartoons have appeared in galleries and national publications. His comic strip, "Washashores," appears weekly in the "Provincetown Banner."

Beverly Bentley (Mrs. Hale/Agatha Stanhope). Beverly is delighted to be working with PTC. She is happy when she is working at her craft, which she has been doing since 1951 when she began her acting career in New York City. Beverly is a member of Actors' Equity,

SAG and AFTRA. Recent performances also include *Men's Lives* for PRT, and *Bed and Breakfast* for Beekman Place Productions this past summer.

Lucy Bishop (Mrs. Hodges). Lucy joined PTC as House Manager for the 1997 summer season. She majored in theater arts at Texas A&M University, focusing on children's theater. Casey Clark (George Henderson). Casey was recently featured in the Wellfleet Harbor Actors Theater production of *7 Blowjobs* and the PTC summer production of *Cute Boys....* Last year Casey was seen in the W.H.A.T. production of *All in the Timing*. Stuard Derrick (Narrator/Director). Stuard is the director of the Provincetown Playwrights series at the Provincetown Library, where he has directed evenings of staged readings devoted to the works of Eugene O'Neill, Jig Cook, Susan Glaspell, and Harry Kemp. Stuard has also directed with the O'Neill-by-the-Sea Festival and is a former member of the Provincetown Theater Company Board of Directors. As an actor, Stuard appeared this summer as Maurice Fiddler in PTC's Something Cloudy, Something Clear by Tennessee Williams, and as James Eagle in Derek Walcott's Ghost Dance at Castle Hill in Truro.
