

CAST - In Order of Appearance

Lee Elliott (Charles Granillo). Lee has made Provincetown his home for the past three years. He is finishing his second novel, "The Summer of the Solar Eclipse." Lee also writes articles for national magazines and newspapers, including art and theatre reviews. He currently serves on the Provincetown Arts Commission and is a member of the town's Licensing Board.

Jeffry Cismoski (Wyndham Brandon). Jeffry recently directed the PTC holiday production of *Amahl and the Night Visitors*, in which he also appeared as one of the Three Kings. This Friday and Saturday evenings, February 13 and 14, Jeffry will repeat his benefit performance, *A Recipe for Love*, for PTC at the Commons Bistro. This year he is joined by Julie Maykowski. Roger Cacchiotti (Sabot). Roger is proud to begin his third season as Artistic Manag-

He played the youngest son in the Village Playhouse's production of *The Music Man* in New York City. He graduated from New York University where he studied theatre. Jesse is a recent P'town year-rounder.

Julie Maykowski (Leila Arden). Julie hails from beautiful Colorado. She acquired a Bachelor of Music from Drake University and a Master of Music from Wichita State University. She has been heard singing a variety of opera roles including Nannetta in *Falstaff*, Little Red in *Little Red Riding Hood*, Marsinah in *Kismet*, Belinda in *Dido and Aeneas*, and her professional opera debut as Laetitia in *The Old Maid and the Thief*. She was most recently heard as the Mother in the PTC production of *Amahl and the Night Visitors*. She looks forward to her upcoming performance with Jeffry.

Haynes Ownby (Sir Johnstone Kentley). Haynes is an artist who has lived year-round in Provincetown for the past fifteen years. He first came here in 1952 to study with Hans Hofmann. Since 1992 he has performed in is own adaptation of Alfred Jarry's *Ubu* plays, in many of the O'Neill-by-the–Sea readings at the Art Association, in readings written by members of the Provincetown Playwrights Theater Lab, and in PTC's 1996 production of *Bound East for Cardiff*.

Stuard Derrick (Rupert Cadell). Stuard is the director of the Provincetown Playwrights series at the Provincetown Public Library and is a former member of the PTC Board of Directors. As an actor, Stuard has appeared in numerous PTC productions over the past seven years, receiving two A.C.T.E. Best Actor nominations for his roles in the PTC productions of *The Lisbon Traviata* and *Not About Heroes*. Stuard studied acting at the American Academy of Dramatic Arts and Harvard University, and playwriting as an undergraduate at Columbia University.

Greta N. Holman (Narrator). Greta is a P'town year-rounder. She is President and Chief Audio Engineer of Woman Sound Productions, Inc. She is a DJ and a recording engineer who is currently building a recording studio in town. A graduate of Marquette University and native of Wisconsin, she has worked both in radio and television.

Dakota De Smet (Director). An amateur director by age 10, and later a professional director in New York City and London, Dakota has directed and coached acting on all levels: high school, college, community theatre, and off-off Broadway. Patrick Hamilton (1904-1962). English novelist and playwright, born in Hassock, Sussex, his gift was the rendition of a particular brand of English existence, marked by reticence, fear and sublimated desire. *Craven House* (1926) was his first novel, but it was with the plays *Rope* (1929) and *Gaslight* that he became well known. Both plays were later made into movies. *Rope* was inspired by the notorious Leopold and Loeb murder case of 1924, in which two young American graduate students were indicted for the killing of a young boy for the sheer, intellectual curiosity of it. The "unnatural" relationship between the killers was a sensational aspect of the trial, which made front-
