
# ADMINISTRATION




# CURRICULUM

Provincetown High School has a well-balanced program of studies to take care of the needs of the individual student. College preparatory students can take math courses ranging from elementary algebra through trigonometry, four years of English, a minimum of two years in the foreign language department, various history and political science courses, and biology, chemistry, and physics. There has been a newly aroused interest in the latter because of the completion of the new laboratories which give the student a better chance to probe the subject deeper in an atmosphere of modernization.

The Commercial students concentrate their efforts on bookkeeping, shorthand, and typing. Along with this, office techniques and operation of various office machines are taught.

Provincetown High School also offers a household arts course for those who are interested in cooking, sewing, and managing a home. The vocational department of the high school focuses its attention on the mechanical aspects of our moving world, and trains students who are interested in this field.

Physical education is a required course for every student, a course which is integral in the emphasis of physical fitness throughout the United States today.

Provincetown High School endeavors to promote the high ideal that a sound mind and a sound body are necessary for the development of a sound individual.









Although only Freshmen, we were well represented on all the athletic teams and the cheerleading squad.

## FOOTBALL

The 1963 football squad began with unusual spirit and interest. The first practice was attended by forty-four hopeful candidates. One of the most important changes was the addition of Mr. Paul Seeley and Mr. Paul Boire, worthy assistants to head coach Mr. Walter Dagle.

On September twenty-seventh, we traveled to North Attleboro to engage in the season's opener with Bishop Feehan. In the second quarter, exchanged punts set up a Feehan score. The end of the first half found us at a 6-0 deficit. A fired-up Feehan ball club drove the length of the field for the second and final touchdown of the game. The final score was 12-0 in favor of Bishop Feehan.

October fifth found the Fishermen traveling to Martha's Vineyard to engage in its second encounter of the season and Provincetown was the victim of a 14-0 loss.

On October twelfth the Fishermen entertained Aponequet at home. The visitors capitalized on Cape-tip fumbles and at the end of the first half had a 22-0 lead. Provincetown couldn't get started although the defensive unit began to click in the third period. The fourth quarter saw the last Aponequet touchdown and the final score stood at 34-0 in favor of Aponequet.

On October nineteenth West Bridgewater played host to Provincetown. Scoreless and held to eleven yards on the ground through three quarters of play, the Fishermen

struck twice in the last quarter of play. Both West Bridgewater and Provincetown fans cheered for this was the first Provincetown score of the season. The Fishermen were handed their fourth loss in a row but the game proved to be a moral victory since we realized for the first time that we COULD score.

Provincetown continued its losing streak on October twenty-sixth, when we played Martha's Vineyard at home. Until the final whistle had blown there was the possibility of a tie and perhaps a win with an extra point. A fired-up Provincetown squad was on the march at the final gun but time ran out as the Orange and Black tried desperately via the pass route to please a home town Evans Field crowd.


Victory was a long time coming--more than two years in fact--but it was decisive, as the Provincetown Fishermen finally broke into the win column defeating Nantucket High 28-8 at Evans Field. Provincetown's next victory was at the expense of the defending Cape and State Champions, Lawrence High of Falmouth. Although the Fishermen's attack was not as exciting as usual, Provincetown still managed to breeze to a 55-32 victory. DeRiggs led all scorers with 18 points followed by Colley with 15.

Provincetown's most impressive victory of the season came at Dennis-Yarmouth where the Fishermen romped to a 65-42 thrashing of the Dolphins. After the exciting D-Y game, the Murphys had a run-of-the-mill game against Nauset.



Provincetown's next game was with the undefeated Harwich Rough Riders. The Rough Riders were taking a 10 game winning streak into the contest, and the Fishermen had eight consecutive wins. Before a packed house at Harwich the Fishermen chalked up an exciting 51-47 victory over the home team.

As the LONG POINTER goes to press, the Fishermen have a 9-1 league standing and a 11-1 over all record. Provincetown needs a single victory to qualify for the Tech Tournament berth and is almost assured of a berth in the Principal's Tournament.


For this reason, the Provincetown team and its followers were overwhelmed with joy.



The first game found us traveling to Nauset to meet the Warriors. The final outcome of the game was a bitter defeat.


The second game of the season was at Harwich High School. Our team was in there fighting until the final whistle but, once again, we were listed in the loss column.




